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early stage services

"Early stage" refers to people, irrespective of age, who are diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease or related disorders and are in the beginning stages of the disease. In this stage, they retain the ability to participate in daily activities and in a give-and-take dialogue.



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KNOW the 10 SIGNS

- Memory changes that disrupt daily life
- Challenges in planning or solving problems
- Oifficulty completing familiar tasks


EARLY DETECTION MATTERS

- Confusion with time or place
- Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships
- New problems with words in speaking or writing
- Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps
- 8 Decreased or poor judgment
- Withdrawal from work or social activities
